

TRIBUTE TO PAUL P. HARRIS



Rotary started with the vision of one man — Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships.

Over time, Rotary's reach and vision gradually extended to humanitarian service. Members have a long track record of addressing challenges in their communities and around the world.

Paul.P. Harris was born on 19th April 1868 at Racine, Wisconsin, USA to George and Cornilla Harris. He graduated with a Bachelor of Laws in June 1891 from University of Iowa. He began to practice in 1896 in Chicago's main business district.

After establishing law practice, he began to consider the benefits of formation of a social organization for local professionals. In 1905, he organized the first Rotary club "in **fellowship and friendship**" with three clients and local businessmen. Soon he realized Rotary needed a greater purpose – 'Service'.

Today, Rotary has grown into the world's largest social organization. On our Charter presentation cum installation day, The Rotary club of Bhubaneswar Flamingo pays tribute to this visionary man.


THE BIRTH OF ROTARY

The first Rotary Club was formed when attorney Paul P. Harris called together a meeting of three business acquaintances in downtown Chicago, United States, at Harris's friend Gustavus Loehr's office in the Unity Building on Dearborn Street on February 23, 1905. In addition to Harris and Loehr (a mining engineer and freemason), Silvester Schiele (a coal merchant), and Hiram E. Shorey (a tailor) were the other two who attended this first meeting. The members chose the name Rotary because initially they rotated subsequent weekly club meetings to each other's offices, although within a year, the Chicago club became so large it became necessary to adopt the now-common practice of a regular meeting place.

The next four Rotary Clubs were organized in cities in the western United States, beginning with San Francisco, then Oakland, Seattle, and Los Angeles. The National Association of Rotary Clubs in America was formed in 1910. On November 3, 1910, a Rotary club began meeting in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, the beginning of the organisation's internationality. On 22 February 1911, the first meeting of the Rotary Club Dublin was held in Dublin, Ireland. This was the first club established outside of North America. In April 1912, Rotary chartered the Winnipeg club marking the first establishment of an American-style service club outside the United States. To reflect the addition of a club outside of the United States, the name was changed to the International Association of Rotary Clubs in 1912.

In August 1912, the Rotary Club of London received its charter from the Association, marking the first acknowledged Rotary club outside North America. It later became known that the Dublin club in Ireland was organized before the London club, but the Dublin club did not receive its charter until after the London club was chartered. During World War I, Rotary in Britain increased from 9 to 22 clubs, and other early clubs in other nations included those in Cuba in 1916, Philippines in 1919 and India in 1920.

In 1922, the name was changed to Rotary International. By 1925, Rotary had grown to 200 clubs with more than 20,000 members. In 1985, Rotary launched its Polio Plus program to immunize all of the world's children against polio. By 2022, Rotary has more than 1.4 million members in over 46,000 clubs among more than 200 countries and geographical areas, making it the most widespread by branches and second largest service club by membership, behind Lions Clubs International.

Shekhar Mehta President 2021-22 Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar West Bengal, India

Rtn.Shekhar Mehta is the 4th Indian in the 117 years of history of Rotary to occupy the highest position of Leadership as Rotary International President ,2021-22. He was born in Calcutta in the year 1959.He graduated from the prestigious St. Xavier's College, Kolkata.He earned Master's degree in Commerce subsequently. He is also a certified Chartered Accountant, Cost Accountant, and also a Company Secretary - a rare combination of qualifications and knowledge that ultimately shaped him to become a World leader.

Rtn.Shekhar Mehta, heads the Skyline Group, a real estate development company he founded. He is also a Director of Operation 'Eyesight Universal (India)', a Canada-based organization.

A Rotary member since 1984 at Rotary Club of Calcutta Mahanagar, Mehta has served as District Governor in 1999-2000 and was elevated to the Board of Directors of Rotary International as a Director in 2011-13. He served as Chair of several committees of Rotary International such as Joint Partnership Committee, Strategic Committee, Chairman of Rotary India Literacy Mission (RILM), Rotary Foundation India, Rotary India Centennial Celebration, Rotary India Humanity Foundation etc. He also served as Zone Coordinator, Training Leader, member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers,

Mehta has led many significant initiatives in India and South Asia. He has been actively involved in disaster response and is a trustee of ShelterBox, UK. After the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, he helped build nearly 500 homes for families affected by the disaster at Andaman & Nicobar Islands. Starting the Shelter Kit program in India, he distributed 15,000 shelter Kits helping about 75,000 disaster victims. He pioneered a program called Saving Little Hearts that has performed more than 1,500 life-changing heart surgeries in South Asia. He is also the architect of the T-E-A-C-H Program, which promotes literacy throughout India and has reached thousands of schools. He has been instrumental in setting up more than 15 Eye Hospitals across India serving nearly 50,000 eye operations each year.

Mehta is a recipient of the highest awards of Rotary International and the Rotary Foundation such as Rotary's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Awards.

He is married to Rashi Mehta, a social worker and a stage artist having performed in socially relevant plays across India. They are blessed with son Chirag and daughter Chandni. He and his wife, Rashi, are Major Donors and members of the Bequest Society.

2021 -22 THEME ADDRESS Shekhar Mehta RI President-elect 1 February 2021

Namaste. Hello, the movers and shakers of Rotary around the world. You, the DGEs, are the movers, and I am Shekhar. Today you are taking a very important step in your journey of service and leadership. The forthcoming 17 months will be the most amazing, fruitful months in your life. You can turn this period into the most satisfying period of your life. During this period, I urge you to dream big, guided by our shared vision for Rotary. You will plan and set goals, inspire and motivate Rotarians to reach goals — goals to expand the reach of our organization by increasing membership, and goals to increase the impact of Rotary by serving the world. And in this journey, you will play a stellar role as you share your goals with Rotarians and Rotaractors in your district and inspire them to "do more and grow more." Friends, this will be our guiding mantra. "Do more" as in bigger and impactful service projects, and "grow more" as in increasing our membership and expanding the participation. Membership, friends, continues to be our biggest challenge. For the last 17-plus years, our membership has been at 1.2 million. Together let us change that over the next 17 months. My dear change-maker governors, here is your opportunity to make the biggest change in Rotary history as far as membership is concerned. What we have not accomplished in the last 17 years, I challenge you to accomplish in 17 months. But that's too big a dream, you may say. Well, if I ask you to dream big. I have to lead from the front. One of my inspirations comes from what George Bernard Shaw said. He said, "You see things; and you say 'why?' But I dream of things that never were; and I say 'Why not?'" So, friends, the dream is to increase our membership to 1.3 million by 1 July 2022! How can we reach that incredible goal? The answer is each one, bring one — ask each Rotarian to bring one member to Rotary in the next 17 months. Just one member in 17 months is all you need to ask of every Rotarian in your district. You can ensure this by leading by example and having your club presidents lead by example as well. As Rotarians in every club do this, they too will become change-makers, as they will change for good the lives of each person that they make a Rotarian.

SHEKHAR MEHTA, 2021 -22 THEME ADDRESS 2

Governors-elect, we need to *grow more* to *do more*. I have always hugely been inspired by the motto of Rotary — Service Above Self. It has taught me to care for others and share with others. Service, to me, is about thinking of others even before I think of myself. On thinking about others, let me share one of my Rotary moments. I had just joined my Rotary club, and

the club organized a limb camp. Here we were, distributing calipers, artificial limbs, and handcycles. Every member was given some responsibility and so was I. I was to check if the beneficiary of the hand cycle had enough strength in his hand to ride the tricycle by his hands. And I was to do this by asking the beneficiary to pull my hand, so that I could fathom the strength in his hands. As I stood in my designated spot, waiting for the beneficiary to come, I saw him crawling towards me. He had no legs, so he had to crawl towards me. I stretched my hands to hold him, and I'll be honest, at that moment, I was thinking about me and not about him. I was thinking about my cleanliness, my health. I did not want to hold his hand. But I did it and kept thinking of myself for the second and third set of hands. But suddenly after the sixth, seventh set of hands, my empathy towards their plight grew and soon enough I could feel their pain, their challenges, and I was thinking more about them than I was thinking of myself. It was at that moment, friends, when from being just a member of my Rotary club, I became a Rotarian. Soon I started attending more club projects. As a Rotarian, when I had first gone out to the rural areas of India 35 years back, I truly understood the plight of my brethren. They had no toilets in their homes, the water they drank was from the same pond that they bathed in, the schools were in the shade of a tree, and the black painted wall was the only blackboard in the school. The nearest health center was a few miles away with basic facilities. And then, through my Rotary club, we helped set up toilets, provided clean drinking water, enhanced the education system, and set up world-class health facilities, not just in my community or my city, but in my country. Rotary kindled the spark within me to look beyond myself and embrace humanity. Service became a way of life for me, and my life's guiding philosophy became, "Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on this earth." And I want to be a good tenant of this earth. I am sure each of you also has found your opportunity to serve. You too may have provided eyesight to the blind, food to the hungry, homes to the homeless. They may have been small opportunities for service or large projects. More than just the size, it is the attitude that defines service. Gandhi was once getting up on a train. Even as he was getting up on the train, the train started moving, and one of his slippers fell off. Gandhi's immediate reaction was to throw his other slipper to where the previous one had fallen. His friend was traveling with him and asked him, "Why did you do that?" Gandhi said, "Someone will find that slipper. What good will be one slipper to him? So, I threw the other." Friends, it was a small act of service, but I think it was a big attitude of service. Are we also ready to think of others before we think of ourselves? As Rotarians, we can do just that.

SHEKHAR MEHTA, 2021 -22 THEME ADDRESS 3

Why else have Rotarians spent billions of dollars and volunteer hours over the last 35-plus years to eradicate polio and serve mankind? Why else have we set up thousands of schools, hundreds of hospitals, provided water in parched villages, brought dignity to people by providing toilets in their homes, given the gift of life to tens of thousands of children by doing their heart surgeries? Rotarians keep serving because we want to change lives. One project in Nepal changed the lives of a few thousand people, the family health program in Africa has served millions of people, a water project in Haiti has changed the lives of more than 10 million people. Back home in India, the T-E-A-C-H program of literacy and education has impacted the lives of millions of children. Many of you have been an important part of similar service projects, and you have changed the lives of people. There was a need to serve, and you served. Today the need to serve has become even more necessary and apparent. So, my dear change-maker governors, in the coming Rotary year, I request you,

urge you, cajole you to serve people and help to change their lives. So, my dear governors, our theme for the year 2021-22 is

Serve to Change Lives.

I urge you to lead by example and inspire Rotarians and Rotaractors to participate in projects that have a sustained impact. Join hands with other Rotarians, other organizations, corporations, and do projects that impact your community, your city - projects that can change lives of people across the country and around the world. At the end of your term as district governor, you should feel that because of your leadership, because of your inspiration to the Rotarians and Rotaractors, the world has changed for the better because of the service done by them during the year. As we all serve, we change the lives of not only others; we change our lives, too. Vivekananda, one of India's greatest philosophers, said, "When you help someone, do not think that you are obliging him or her. In fact, it is he or she who is obliging you by giving you an opportunity to give back something to this world from where we have received so much." Also, he added beautifully, "In life, take the position of the donor or the server, and yet be so humble in giving and serving that let the donor or server kneel down and ask: 'May I give? May I serve?'" Friends, to live for others, to care for others, to serve others and change their lives is the best way to live our own lives. Just as Albert Einstein said, "Only a life lived for others is a life worthwhile." And friends, as we go about our service initiatives, our special focus this year will be on empowering girls. One of Rotary's core values is diversity. We have a public statement that outlines our belief in DEI - diversity, equity, and inclusion. It is important that we empower the girl as we all find that more often than not, the girl is disadvantaged. We will serve all children, but our focus will be specially on the girl. There are many issues that girls face in different parts of the world, and you as leaders will ensure that we try to mitigate the disadvantage of the girl that they may have. Friends, to do more and grow more, we have designed some presidential initiatives.

SHEKHAR MEHTA, 2021 -22 THEME ADDRESS 4

There will be seven presidential conferences across the world focusing on the seven areas of focus. And for every Rotary and Rotaract club to be able to organize and engage Rotarians and Rotaractors, and the public at large, we will have Rotary Days of Service. Do participate in the presidential conference closest to home and do encourage every club to participate in a Rotary Day of Service. Let them join Rotaractors and Interactors. Let us showcase our work the world over through thousands of Rotary Days of Service by Rotary clubs.

Dear change-maker governors, ending polio, fighting COVID, working on large impactful projects, and increasing our membership to a never-before 1.3 million — the task ahead is challenging. And that should excite you. Rotarians love challenges. A ship is safe in the harbor, but that is not what ships are meant for. They need to go out on the high seas. Life, my dear change-makers, is about adventure and not maintenance.



Let me end with what I have penned for our theme:

The biggest gift we are given Is the power to touch a life To change, To make a difference In the circle of life. If we can reach out With our hands, heart, and soul The magic will begin to happen As the wheel begins to roll ... Let's turn the wheel together So all humanity thrives We have the power and the magic To serve ... to change lives ... 





OUR IGNORANCE THAT MATTERS

Hemoglobinopathies are inherited disorders of red blood cells. It is the commonest genetic blood disorder worldwide. Apart from nutritional anemia and infectious disease, Haemoglobinopathies are emerging as a

major national health problem. They include thalassemias and abnormal variant hemoglobins such as Hemoglobin S, D, E etc. Abnormal hemoglobin is found in 7 out of every 100 persons on this globe. Being an important cause of morbidity and mortality, they impose a heavy burden on the health sector and families.

MAGNITUDE OF BURDEN:

India is known to be the capital of Thalassemia, as it has the largest number of children with Thalassemia major in the world – about 1 to 1.5 lakhs and almost 42 million silent carriers of β (beta) thalassemia trait. The traits or carrier live a normal life without any significant symptoms. About 10,000 -15,000 babies with thalassemia major are born every year. Annually 300,000 to 500,000 children are born with clinically significant hemoglobin disorder, of which 70% is shared by sickle cell disease and the rest by Thalassemia.

MODE OF INCREASE IN BURDEN:

Persons carrying only one defective gene are called 'carriers' and they do not suffer from the disease symptomatically but carry the abnormal gene that can be transmitted to the next generation. Carriers cannot be recognized clinically but are identified by performing special blood tests. Where both mother and father are 'carriers', there is a chance that their children may inherit the abnormal gene from both parents and thus suffer from a severe thalassemia syndrome or a Sickle Cell syndrome or may be normal without any abnormal gene or carriers like their parents.

Marriage between two silent carriers of any hemoglobin disorder, may interact among themselves and can result in a serious form of the disease in their children, requiring blood transfusion for survival. This may be associated with chronic, impairing disability or life-threatening conditions that can cause death. Unfortunately, a large number of children continue to be born and suffer from such disorders mainly due to lack of awareness and lack of comprehensive programmes for prevention strategies.

OBSTACLES IN SPREADING OF AWARENESS:

Community control in a vast and diverse country like India is challenging. Almost 70% of the population resides in rural areas where implementation of the national programme of prevention and treatment is yet to begin. Large number of individuals from the rural setting have not heard about thalassemia and the cause of the disease is believed to depend on orthodox feelings like the sins committed by the parents. Further, >50% of individuals from the urban area are still not willing for pre-marital screening.

This emphasizes the need for more intensive education and awareness programmes in different parts of the country. Yet, there is no formal education in the curriculum for high school children. Intense education from the secondary school level should be coupled with education of health professionals for the success of prevention programmes. Mass media is a

very powerful tool. Short clips by leading film personalities should be shown during prime-time television programmes over a period of time that would have a significant impact on the population at large.

SOLUTION:

The magnitude of the problem and the cost implication of management, suitable control measures need to be undertaken urgently. Hence, to prevent or control Haemoglobinopathies is a substantial challenge. It needs a comprehensive integrated approach for both screening and management. This could be primary or secondary. Primary being identifying the carrier followed by genetic counseling for marriage selection and secondary by preventing the birth of affected child. These genetic disorders are preventable and awareness about genetic inheritance can reduce the social health burden.

AWARENESS IS THE FIRST STEP IN CONTROL PROGRAMME

Few among the existing patients are optimally managed. The curative option of stem cell transplant is unaffordable for the majority of families. Therefore, a feasible option for control is to promote education and awareness programmes, intensify screening with micro mapping to assess the true burden, and develop adequate facilities for genetic counseling and prenatal diagnosis in public sector Institutions. Strategies need to include 1) Educating health professionals, school and college students, pregnant women and the population at large 2) Establishing diagnostic facilities in different regions 3) Setting up a greater number of Day Care Centers for managing existing patients 4) Developing cost-effective facilities for stem cell transplantation. The strategies by which Central and State Governments, NGOs, Parents-Patients Societies and Corporate Houses can work together to successfully reduce the burden of hemoglobinopathies in India. The National Health Portal of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India now provides information on these diseases for the public and professionals.

In 2006, the World Health Assembly passed a resolution urging member states "to develop, implement and reinforce comprehensive national, integrated programmes for the prevention and management of haemoglobinopathies." It has clearly outlined the goals for control of hemoglobinopathies - provide affordable and adequate therapy for those affected, while at the same time reduce the number of births of children with the disease through strong political, administrative and financial support.

SHARING ROTARY WITH NON-ROTARIAN

Sharing your Rotary experience with a non-Rotarian is one of the best ways to get that person thinking about Rotary. Following up with an invitation to join — after you've exposed the person to Rotary activities and determined him or her to be a worthy candidate.

If someone you know enjoys a new film and highly recommends it to you personally, it invariably carries much more weight than all of the "must see" advertisements. A personal recommendation from a friend on where to dine is usually more credible than the ratings of a dozen restaurant critics

The moral of the story is that we should never miss the opportunity to speak to a stranger about Rotary, because we never know when we will strike gold. Too many good potential Rotarians say they haven't joined because they have never been asked.

In June 1997, Rotary's worldwide membership stood at about 1,215,000. We reached that tremendous growth primarily as a result of the visionary leadership of Past RI President Herbert Brown. But in less than three years, by June 2000, it had declined by more than 35,000 to less than 1,180,000. For the first time since World War II, membership showed a serious decline over three consecutive Rotary years.

Despite this impressive campaign, we still need to make membership our "number one" challenge.

We must keep Rotary healthy internally if we are to meet our global mission. If we do not build for the future, we are destined to become a relic of the past.

In 2001-02 the RI Board of Directors initiated a worldwide campaign to increase membership in existing clubs and to build new clubs. This campaign — "Rotary's Global Quest" — had a goal for each Rotary club to bring in at least one qualified new member per month during 2001-02, with a minimum net gain of at least five new members per club by the end of the year. In addition to net membership gain in existing clubs, each district was asked to form a minimum of three new clubs or to have at least five clubs attain a net membership increase of at least 15 new members.

Ken Boyd, chairman of the RI Membership Executive Steering Committee, said that "The Rotary world is on fire with excitement for Rotary's Global Quest," he exclaimed, "Districts are reporting success and enthusiasm for an increase in members to help attain the humanitarian ideals of Rotary.

This enthusiasm is just what Rotarians need to make August, officially designated as Rotary's Membership and Extension Month, a resounding success. Though membership development

and the extension of Rotary are year-round endeavors, in August, each club pays special attention to devising ways to retain existing members and recruiting new ones.

I believe the organization is at a critical crossroads," he said. "Over the last 20 years, over 1.3 million people have left Rotary. We think that we are gaining membership every year, but the truth of the matter is that we've been losing members from existing Rotary clubs for the last two decades. And but for those few new clubs (chartered) every year, we would be in a very sorry state, like many organizations similar to Rotary. And so, we either have to do something about it, or we will begin to die."

A net gain of five new members per club translates into an additional US\$8 million for the Foundation annually. "The benefit of all of this will be great for our organization, but the ultimate beneficiaries will be those who are served by a strong Rotary Foundation. They are the reason Rotary must grow."

Rotarians are business and professional leaders who take an active role in their communities while greatly enriching their personal and professional lives. A Rotary club contains a diverse group of professional leaders from the community that the club serves.

Membership in a Rotary club offers a number of benefits, including:

- § effecting change within the community;
- § advancing business and professional contacts;
- § developing leadership skills;
- § gaining an understanding of and having an impact on international humanitarian issues.

Rotary membership provides the opportunity to:

- § become connected to your community;
- § work with others in addressing community needs;
- § interact with other professionals in your community;
- assist with RI's international humanitarian service efforts.
- § establish contacts with an international network of professionals;
- § develop leadership skills;

§ involve family in promoting service efforts.

Through Rotary International's service programs, a Rotary club can have a significant effect on the quality of life in its community. Rotary Foundation programs offer opportunities to form international partnerships that help people in need worldwide. Some 1.2 million Rotarians in more than 35000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas make significant contributions to the quality of life at home and around the globe.

The most important thing is, as Rotarians we must share the story of Rotary, the good work done by Rotarians and clubs around the globe with non-rotarians and speak to them about the amazing service the Rotarians do and the beauty of Rotary. Then only they will be attracted to join.

*What Projects Can My Club Do? *

Immunizations and Antibiotics

FRun information sessions for pregnant mothers on the importance of immunizations.

Fund information leaflets for mothers on immunizations and antibiotics.

Provide immunizations and antibiotics for children under 5 years old.

Fund transportation costs for mothers to get to clinics and health centres to obtain immunizations for their babies.

• Develop and fund a centre specialising in providing immunizations and antibiotics for mothers and children.

Nutrition

Establish and maintain information sessions encouraging mothers to breastfeed their babies.

Establish and maintain public awareness programmes on what constitutes good nutrition, and the importance of good nutrition for mothers and their children.

Identify communities with prevalence of underweight children; provide food baskets for mothers and their children, establish and maintain information and support programmes.

Fund the production of information sheets promoting different diets, as well as techniques to prepare and preserve food.

• Promote the inclusion of public nutrition training in community midwife and nursing education curricular.

Mother to Infant HIV Transmission

Establish and maintain information sessions, workshops, and meetings on how to prevent mother to infant HIV transmission.

Establish and fund a public awareness and information campaign about how to prevent mother to infant HIV transmission.

Establish and fund a programme to give women access to free or low-cost prenatal care and voluntary HIV testing and counselling.

Establish and fund the provision of antiretroviral drugs for mothers, and on-going support and counselling.

Fund a sustainable Maternal and Child Health HIV response programme to strengthen health and community systems, to tackle the social determinants of health that drive the epidemic and hinder the response.

Fund the provision of birthing kits to health care professionals.

Establish and fund a public awareness campaign about available reproductive health services.

Establish and fund information leaflets, meetings and or workshops promoting safe motherhood.

Family Planning

Fund culturally and religion aware Family Planning information sheets and resources.

Establish and fund family planning workshops or training sessions for family planning health care workers.

COMMUNICATION SKILLS-COMMUNICATION FOR WHAT?

Rotary opens opportunities. There are numerous immeasurable benefits of joining Rotary, principal among them is the Social Capital, the opportunities one gets to grow one's managerial leadership & communication skill. Leadership is defined as "the ability to get a person to do what you want him to do, when you want it done, in a way you want it done, because he wants it to do". (Dwight D. Eisenhower)

A leader's most powerful tool is communication. For leaders, effective communication is what enables the leader to rally his/her team around a shared vision, empower members, build trust, successfully navigate organizational change, align efforts to the pursuit of goals & inspire positive change. But the idea that communication skill is "One Size-Fits- All" is a myth. Rather, a leader has to use different communication methods for different purpose. Following are some of them.

COMMUNICATE TO INFORM-Communication, in its most basic form, focuses on developing understanding and sharing meaningful information among communicators. The purpose in sharing the meaningful information may be so that you receive, understand, and use or wield that information. The crux of the matter is whether the person is detail and fact oriented or not.

COMMUNICATION TO ENQUIRE- This is one of the most fragile tasks of a leader. If not done right, things would usually end up worse than when it started. An inquiry is more than just seeking justification of "why? an incident happened; and the question "Why" should be avoided in most of the inquiry because it puts people in defensive mode. Instead of "Why? change the question to "What"? & "When"? The idea of changing the question from "Why" to "What" & "When" is to make sure that the individual does not feel like they are confronted and feel like they need to defend themselves. But all said & done, you are not going to go anywhere with this one unless you have done serious work on your listening skills, and the ability to ask incisive questions.

COMMUNICATE TO EDUCATE-Educative speeches aim to educate an audience on a particular topic or message. Unlike demonstrative speeches, they don't use visual aids. They do, however, use facts, data and statistics to help the audience grasp a concept. Being a successful educative speaker starts with choosing a topic that can engage and educate the audience. But fact remains that leaders who inherently feel insecure when others know/do better than them struggle terribly with this one.

COMMUNICATE TO MOTIVATE-As someone in a leadership position, motivating your team is one of the most important tasks. But one of the most overlooked

ways to motivate your team is through communication. Through effective communication, your team feel empowered. It also gives them a sense of belonging, camaraderie and responsibility. More importantly, when the line of communication is open, your team feel comfortable.

COMMUNICATE TO INSPIRE-If you want to be more inspiring as a leader, you need to develop these six communication skills, (a) Be more focused on others than yourself (b)be an attentive listener (c) be more compelling about what you stand for (d) be an accomplished story teller(e) be a conscious signaler .All said and done, leaders who have not established a human bond of trust with the person(s) they are seeking to inspire are fighting a battle they have already lost. Conversely when you look at your role model here, you will see Trust plastered all over.

COMMUNICATE TO INFLUENCE- Though there are plenty of ways to influence others, generally you need to have some runs on the board first. Leaders who have not build relationships, earned or gained credibility will be on backfoot straight away when it comes to influencing. Reasoning, Consulting and collaborating, inspiring, Trust and credibility are some of the important tools for a leader to influence others. While Trust will loom large as a factor, dive deeper & you discover that leaders who retain accountability if something fails (unlike those who run & hide) are far sharper at influencing.

COMMUNICATE TO CLARIFY-One of the common communication mistakes we make, and the easiest way to better clarify your message so people understand what you mean to say is (a) summarization, (b) documentation(c) follow up. If you consciously and consistently use these techniques, they will soon be become a habit- one that will increase your chances of mastering clear and effective communication on a regular basis. With these, you see a combination of listening ability, coupled with ability to focus on what's correct.

COMMUNICATE TO CONSOLE-Also known as empathy, this is the ability to recognize emotions in others, and to understand other people's perspective on a situation. At its most developed form, it enables you to use that insight to improve someone else's mood and to support you through challenging situations. Unfortunately, it is rarely learnable.

COMMUNICATE TO CONVINCE- Face to face communication is more effective at convincing others because you can create a personal connection with your audience and use eye contact, gestures and other nonverbal signals to maintain their attention. Ask them to share their thoughts, match with their type of reasoning, get them to lower their guard with a genuine compliment & pose a counter argument (without making them defensive).

As long as there is an underlying purpose to address, this will always be a moving list. That is why, we see such a huge imbalance between the time, effort and money invested in helping leaders develop better "Communication Skills "& such poor results when you evaluate from the lens of "desired outcomes".

Ask yourself, **"Communication for what"** before starting the communication. If done, your chances of getting a better outcome may be significantly multiplied.

That is why, it is always safer to believe, "The problem is not really the answer to the problem. It is the meaning of the problem.
