

Friends of the air. It is a real privilege to address you. We are gathered together in Boston from almost every civilized country of the world. We come from the British Isles, China, Japan, European and South American countries, Australia, New Zealand, and many others.

More than forty nations are represented and some of the delegates will have circled the globe on the return to their native countries. It is a most inspiring occasion.

In the present to this gathering, my mind very naturally reverts to that first meeting which was held in Chicago 28 years ago. Four of us were in attendance: Mighty Oaks, from Little Acorns Grow.

Perhaps there are 2 features of Rotary which more than any others challenge the attention of those who are not Rotarians.

One is what we call our classification plan by virtual bridge. Membership in Rotary is limited to one representative of each line of trade or profession.

The other is the provision that neither riches, political nor religious standings shall constitute barriers to membership.

To these two provisions, Rotary is thrown open to representatives of all walks of life.

To representatives of all countries and all forms of religion.

Would this mean to open the door to all manner of discord? One might think so. In fact many have said that human ingenuity could hardly divide a plan of organization more fraught with peril. Here in lies the genious and the Rotary, the glory of Rotary.

The formula of procedure is indeed simple. Why Rotarians differ in many respects – in two respects they are in perfect accord.

First they believe that all nations are respectable and desire to be honorable in their dealings with other nations. That it is the privilege of all men to worship God according to the dictates of their own conscience. In other words Rotary stands for TOLERANCE.

Second they believe, that all honorable vocations are entitled to recognition if they are used in the service of society.

With these signs of agreement firmly established, disagreement is almost unknown.

Rotary emphasizes the points of agreement and avoids controversial issues.

Rotary thus becomes the common denominator, the sanctuary to which all are welcome.

Is there any valid reason why catholic and protestant, Jew and gentile should not enjoy friendly intercourse?

Where it is done in rotary, catholic priests, Jewish rabbis and protestant ministers sit side by side in happy fellowship at Rotary Club meetings. Even if travels take you to India there you may meet Mohammedans, Hindus and Christians, breaking bread together. Is this not as it should be?

Remember the words: Peace, honor, goodwill toward all men.

To put it readily: Rotary is trying to make the words of Robert Burns come true:

You remember that: The time will come for all of us where man to man shall Brother be for a that.

Those outside the membership frequently ask the question.

How did it come about? That's a hard question to answer.

One answer would be that Rotary's popular appeal is due to the fact that In Rotary men are encouraged to be natural. Just to be themselves. In this world were artificiality so abounds, it is refreshing to meet with groups who are not worshippers of cold meaningless formalities.

Further there is a bit of the boy in every man, and friendly natural intercourse is the best way to bring it out.

I wished it might be your privilege, as it is mine tonight, to look in on this happy throng of big strong men from occident and orient from the frozen north and from down beneath the equator.

Many of them have their wives with them and the faces of all our radiance with smiles as they clasped each others' hands. If you were here I believe that you would agree with me in my conclusion that the words of the Bard of Ayr were not the expression of an idle dream, that they were indeed prophetic and that the finest conception of human mind the conception of universal goodwill and peace will in God's good time be realized in very truth.

Rotary in a final analysis is a way of life, of a good, natural, wholesome friendly way of life.

The world is full of potential Rotarians who are not Rotarians in fact.

Many of them are listening to me now.

If you have the love of your fellowmen in your heart my friends, you are potential Rotarians.



Jennifer Jones is the founder and president of Media Street Productions, an award-winning 27-year-old media company in Windsor, Ontario. She is a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland.



Jennifer's talents have strengthened Rotary's reach and impact as she has served in roles including vice president, director, Rotary Foundation trustee, and cochair of the End Polio Now: Make History Today fundraising campaign.

Jennifer is a leader in cultivating experiential fundraising opportunities, such as a day of golfing with Rotary polio ambassador Jack Nicklaus in Jupiter, Florida, USA, that raised over \$5.25 million for polio eradication. She also led the innovative #RotaryResponds virtual event in May 2020, which raised money for COVID-19 relief projects and showcased how Rotary members were responding to the pandemic around the world.

Working alongside political figures, celebrities, and global leaders, Jennifer has raised awareness and hundreds of millions of dollars to eradicate disease, support peace, and provide clean water and sanitation. An expert storyteller, she inspires hope and promise and motivates people to take action.

She has received the Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) and has been recognized with the YMCA Peace Medal and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and she was the first Canadian to receive Wayne State University's Community Peacemaker Award.

Jennifer is married to Rotary member Nick Krayacich, a family physician. They share a love for travel, cycling, golf, and relaxing at their family cottage, in addition to adventures such as climbing to the summit of Kilimanjaro in Tanzania.

I'll admit that as much as I appreciate a digital copy, I still revel in the tactile sensation of sitting down and leafing through the glossy pages. They are a treasure trove of photos and memorable stories about our great organization — the one we all know and love. I have learned so much over the years about service projects and lives that each of you have transformed.

As a communications professional, I have longed for the day that our stories were a regular part of mainstream media and that our flagship magazine might populate doctor's offices, coffee shops, or anywhere else people sit, wait, and browse. So, what are your stories and who can help tell them? I hope you might consider your own Imagine Impact efforts — your story might be something you can promote just as easily on social media or during a Zoom call. Think about ways to showcase notable projects in your clubs and districts.

We all feel the impact that Rotary service and values have on us. Now it's our opportunity to share that feeling with others.

Jones urges club leaders to incorporate "entrance interviews" as well to understand the needs and expectations of new members at the outset. And of course, be sure to regularly survey all existing members, to ensure they have an opportunity to share thoughts about their membership experience.


Empowering Girls







Was needed.



WOMAN EMPOWERMENT AND THALASSEMIA PREVENTION

CONCEPT ON THALASSEMIA:

Thalassemia is an inherited red blood cell abnormality, a state of chronic illness that requires lifelong treatment, which includes repeated blood transfusion, and regular intake of medicines for removal of iron, and the only curative option is a bone marrow transplant. Failing in proper management, increases the mortality and morbidity from Thalassemia, in those countries where it is prevalent. It places a financial and emotional burden on the family and the entire healthcare system. Therefore, Prevention is a better option to reduce the sufferers and the suffering.

MAGNITUDE OF THALASSEMIA:

India carries a substantial public health problem of Thalassemia. As per the National Health Mission (2016) report, there are approximately l-l.5 lakh children with Thalassemia Major and nearly 42 million carriers of the β Thalassemia trait. However, in India the reported average prevalence of Thalassemia carriers is 3-4%, implies that there are 30-40 million carriers in this multicultural and multilingual population of l.3 billion people.

UNDERSTANDING ABOUT INHERITANCE:

Thalassemia is a genetically inherited disorder. Parents usually carry the defective gene, if they have given birth to a thalassemia child with the disease. The occurrence of this

thalassemia gene in the family can be either in the form of disease or as a carrier. When the defective genes are inherited from both parents, a thalassemia disease comes into

existence. When one defective gene is inherited from either of the parents, then it is only a state of defective gene carrier or trait but not the disease. Usually, the trait does not show significant symptom of the disease but can pass the defective gene to the future generation. Now, the families with thalassemia genes are getting identified retrospectively i.e. after the birth of a new thalassemia case.

WOMAN EMPOWERMENT AS A RESOURCEFUL PREVENTABLE MEASURE:

Women are a pivot in the family and also a strong pillar of society. A woman is a friend, daughter, sister, spouse, and mother, and can be a responsible citizen of the nation. If she understands the gravity of health issues, can re-enforce and implement the desired issue in different aspects. Irrespective of their education level, they have the capacity to balance most situations by utilizing their skills and intellect. They can be resourceful entities to execute the prevention strategy in society. Myth and social fear about this genetic disorder can get nullified with her understanding and subsequently, volunteer for screening. As a whole, it will affect the psychology of society, starting from individuals, their parents, children, brothers, sisters, and even extended family. This can be alleviated by improving knowledge, changing social attitudes, and by enhancing practice among the population. Furthermore, the optimistic thought in a woman may make life-altering decisions based on the results of a genetic test.

ADVANTAGES OF THALASSEMIA AWARENESS IN WOMEN:

In the present scenario, thalassemia stands with social fear which has an adverse impact on volunteer screening. But this can be eradicated with woman empowerment through enhancing their literacy and independence. Awareness about Thalassemia and its screening will enable a woman to make life choices, including screening for carrier status and decision-making in concern to marriages, screening her children, and saving their generation from the emerging disease. Early detection of carriers gives opportunities for informed choices for future decision-making. Premarital screening alone can tremendously decrease the birth prevalence of β -Thalassemia major.

PREVENTION STRATEGY:

The National Health Mission of India has formulated a framework for preventing and managing these haemoglobin disorders. Community-based public health efforts such as

educating health professionals, school and college students, and pregnant women, play a crucial role in the health and wellness of the society at large. The vital preventive measure includes general public awareness, volunteering for mass screening and counselling of at-risk families, and pre-marital and prenatal diagnosis. These strategies will reduce the incidence of new cases in the future generation. Awareness and screening programs can significantly impact the detection of Thalassemia carriers in low-resource-constrained countries. Women empowerment can play a vital role in the prevention of Thalassemia. It can boost their self-confidence, individuality, self-respect, personality, capacity, talent, and efficiency, which will work as a boon that will work at an individual level, family, community, and even for future generations. How much young women should be made aware of Thalassemia and its screening for carrier status and make them realize the importance of willingness to screen. It strongly supports the need for participants to receive an education drive on Thalassemia at the educational institution that will empower a girl/woman, and raise awareness on Thalassemia and screen carriers.

Diversity is less about what makes people different—their race, socioeconomic status, gender, physical abilities and so on—and more about understanding, accepting and valuing those differences. Whereas diversity refers to various ways that people differ, equity is about creating fair access, opportunity, and advancement for all those different people. Successful equity initiatives, then, must build fairness and equal treatment into the very fabric of an organization. This requires a design for creating, maintaining, and protecting equity organization-wise, club wise, district wise. Equity recognizes that each person has different circumstances and allocates the exact resources and opportunities needed to reach an optimal outcome. There's a misconception that environments in which diversity and equity are priorities, naturally beget inclusion. It's not always so. Inclusion is the extent to which all the stakeholders feel a sense of belonging and value within a given organizational setting. All leaders should lead with inclusion, because if we create an inclusive environment, then diversity will come automatically. Diversity is a fact. Inclusion is an act — it takes effort and practice. Inclusion leads to equity. Planning for an Inclusive club or district are now equipped with a new concept of DEI, it's time to consider the culture we want to create to make inclusivity a core part of what we do rather than just a one-time effort. Martin Luther King Jr had said, 'Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere'. He had a dream for a society that would judge his children not by the colour of their skin, but by the content of their character.

DEFINING EMPOWERMENT

'Empowerment' literally means 'to invest with power'. When we talk about empowering women, it has gone to a much broader connotation not limiting to biological inequality and gender differences. In fact, the concept clarifies various myths about the secondary roles of women in the society. It aims to overcome the barriers, discriminations, prejudices that the women are facing in order to generate an environment for their participation in full potency in social, psychological, economic, political and educational spheres. It is a process of transforming one's life situation by gaining control over the self as well as the environment, both internal and external. Empowerment emphasises on improvement in decision making roles, rights to earn as well as to spend, non-discriminatory legal, political and inheritance rights and a capacity to assert against patriarchal norms justifying gender bias in society. In other words, it signifies capacity building. Although women's problems are global issues, it is more pernicious in continents like Asia and Africa where still extended family system, poverty, illiteracy are prevailing. A country's total growth depends on the contribution of women who are almost half of the population.

Women, on whom long-term investments are made, have more bargaining power. Investments depends upon the vision of future and the needs of the present determined by the ideologies of culture. A majority of women, rooted in patrilineal, patri-virilocal kinship, with limited rights over resources and virtually no inheritance rights, dependent, secluded and segregated, their sexuality managed by men, do not have choices or have only limited choices. Most women are still struggling in their quest to achieve power, autonomy and status. In spite of equality guaranteed by law, women in most cases are still suffering in all sections of the society. There are family violence, use of abusive language towards them, workplace harassment, physical and mental torture, dowry issues to name a few. Socio-cultural patterns, taboos and stigmas prohibit most of them to seek the help of law or even to speak about it in public. Patrilineal form of family in most Asian countries tends to be unusually harsh on women with mechanism for the management of their sexuality, material dependence, procreative power. Women constantly struggle for identity in their new matrimonial homes. Gender disparity prevails in most educated families in India vividly seen through the preference for a male child. Ironically, many a times the same mother treats her son and daughter differently. So, it's not only the men responsible for the in-equal status of women at home, women are equally responsible for it. A matrilineal society, on the contrary, gives more power to women folks relatively maintaining an egalitarian status with rights to inheritance and control over economy.

EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN: FROM CAPACITY BUILDING TO IDENTITY BUILDING

The concept of women empowerment, gender equitable status came in to focus with Beijing Conference. People all over the world started working on various concepts and dimensions of empowerment. What exactly empowerment means or tends to achieve? Whether, it means an egalitarian society or female dominated society? How to empower a woman in her own home and make her identity visible? Law alone cannot empower anyone. She needs to be vocal, assertive and make herself understood by all those who surround her. However, demographic research over the past couple of decades has confirmed that a preference for a male child over a female child entrenched in many countries all over the world. In such settings, religious traditions and social norms coupled with economic discrimination against women and girls conspire to ensure that young boys have greater access to education, healthcare and even food than do their sisters. Such neglect leads to markedly higher rate of illiteracy, malnutrition and poor health for girls. Female child infanticides, child sex abuse, child pregnancy is not uncommon in many societies. Sexual abuse can lead to a wide variety of unhealthy consequences, including behavioural and psychological problems, sexual dysfunction, relationship problems, low self-esteem, depression, thoughts of suicide, alcohol and substance abuse and sexual risk taking. Women who are sexually abused in childhood also are at greater risk of being physically or sexually abused as adults.

AGENDA FOR EMPOWERING WOMEN & ENDING VIOLENCE

Various national governments over the years have implemented various schemes, laws etc to empower women through education, training and employment in workforce to end violence against them and to give them equitable position. Some women have excelled in all fields and have become Prime Ministers and Presidents also. But, the ratio is not very encouraging. We still need a long way to go. Empowering women and girls is not only a worthy goal in its own right but also is a key strategy of eliminating violence. Women will never escape violence as long as they are economically dependent or do not have leadership and decision-making roles. Empowering women is viewed as a long-term process occurring at international, national, community and individual level. Its goal is to eliminate discrimination against women, to strengthen them in leadership and decision-making roles, to increase their access to education, skill development, healthcare system including menstrual health and hygiene and employment, to improve control over their own bodies and self esteem and to develop sense of personal power. It's a fact that when a woman is empowered, the entire family is empowered.

ROLE OF A ROTARY CLUB IN THE PROCESS OF EMPOWERING WOMEN

A Rotary club has a significant role to play in empowering women and girls as Rotarians work at the grassroot level in the community and hence, can feel where the issues lie. A single frame cannot fit all photos of different shapes and sizes. Similarly, while we take up the projects to empower the women/girls in a particular community, we need to assess the community's need, our goals, focus areas, available resources and most importantly the motivation of the beneficiaries to avail the opportunity and to fully encash it. Motivation can be stimulated. We as Rotarians must make awareness program, before implementing a scheme that will automatically motivate the beneficiaries to enrol in the scheme. From vocational training to self-defence training, from soft skill development to peace scholarship, from building girls' toilets to helping nursing mothers there are n number of areas where Rotarians can take up projects to empower girls. But whatever projects we do take up, it's most essential to inculcate a sense of self-respect and self-esteem in our women beneficiaries (done through discussion and dialogues several times) who must change their own perception towards their own selves ones existence, capacity and capabilities so that they can build their inner strength to establish their own self-identities and empower themselves.
